Reclaiming Native Psychological Brilliance Series Success

January 2022 – October 2022 (10 months):

- 2,099 registrants
- Registrants each month ranged from 317 to 486 people
- Number of actual attendees each month ranged from 112 to 207 people
- Number of post-views ranged from 82 to 664

Reclaiming Native Psychological Brilliance Series Success (continued)

January 2022 – August 2022 (first 8 months) participants represented:

- 372 Tribal Nations
- 52 federal and state partner organizations
- 99 Native organizations
- 84 schools and universities
- 117 hospitals, health clinics, and treatment centers
- All 12 of the Tribal Epidemiology Centers

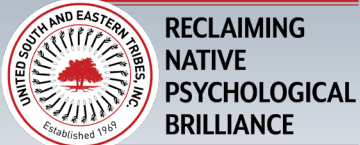
