





Indian Country ECHO - Ending the Epidemics Training

Staff serving American Indian & Alaska Native people are invited to participate in the Ending the Epidemics ECHO programs. The program provides the rationale, program design, and tools that can be used by healthcare clinicians and tribal decision makers to develop and enhance programs to address the syndemic of interrelated disease states of Hepatitis C Virus, HIV, Substance Use Disorders, and Sexually Transmitted Infections. The program will offer a free 2 day training with subsequent telehealth clinics. CE credits will be available.
